Bring Your Own Laptop for Junior School in 2019 (BYOL)

Karamu High School is committed to providing quality forward thinking education for all students. We promote quality learning, anytime, anywhere. In 2019 we are aspiring for all of our current Year 9 moving into Year 10 and the new Year 9 students to Karamu to have access to their own laptop.

The initiative to include laptops as a tool in the classroom has seen a wider range of blended approaches in the students learning and the ability to access information at any time. Following on from the success of the option to bring a laptop in the current Year 9 group with a 70% uptake and the increased flexibility and opportunities our students are gaining from having access to a laptop, we feel this is an opportune time to make this move.

We would encourage families to start planning to see how they can work towards their son or daughter having ready access to a laptop both at school and at home. The laptops do not have to be the latest or the highest spec as they are a tool; the learning happens with the students doing the work. Some families, workplaces and friends upgrade their laptops and this would be an opportunity for students to acquire one. If you have any questions or would like to discuss this initiative please do not hesitate to contact me.

For the laptop a minimum of an 11 - 14 inch screen with 4 GB of RAM would be sufficient. We supply fast and efficient wi-fi connection and free Microsoft Office.

Academically all students have been busy this term. Year 9 and 10 have had a series of tests which provide us with a range of data to enable us to see how to best help them learn, and Year 11-13 have started their NCEA journeys. This journey started with over 250 Year 11 and 12 parents/whanau taking up the opportunity to attend a learning conference with their son/daughter and form teacher. Goals were set and now we will work together to see how best to achieve these goals in 2018. If you were unable to make these at this time please still feel free to contact the office and they will put you in touch with the form teacher.

In order for Year 11-13 students to achieve their goals they need a number of mechanisms in place. Consistent focus in class, sustained completion of homework and meeting regular milestones are all necessary. You as whanau can track senior student milestones and assessments on our school website under the Academic section. Also on here are a series of useful documents including NCEA for Parents and Students, Extension Forms, Appeals, the NCEA Exam Timetable for 2018 and Financial Information for 2018. Students who for very legitimate reasons cannot meet deadlines (bereavement, illness or injury) should complete the Extension Form with evidence of their work and take it to their teacher to apply for an extension.

Our Academic Leaders have started the year running Homework Club each Tuesday and Thursday after school and Wednesday 8:30 - 9:00am for any students who want help or just need a quiet place to work with wi-fi. Alongside sustained support from teachers and home we believe every student can achieve their personal best if they invest in themselves first.

FOOD FOR THOUGHT

EVERY DAY MATTERS

Keeping students in education is vital for their success at school and in later life. The research tells us that student attendance, along with effective teaching, has the greatest influence on student engagement and achievement. The fewer days that students are at school, the less chance they have of achieving. Missing school isn't just about missing learning; it's also about all the opportunities that are missed – every day matters!

We believe based on national and regional data that a minimum attendance rate of **90% at each year level** is a realistic and achievable target. At Karamu High School we take attendance very seriously, knowing that good attendance guarantees great outcomes for our students. We monitor attendance very closely and are working hard to achieve these targets.

Legislation Governing Attendance:

Schools (boards, principals, and individual teachers), along with parents and guardians, are responsible for making sure students attend school regularly. Under Sections 25 and 31 of the Education Act 1989, every school board must take all reasonable steps to make sure students attend school when it is open.

At Karamu High School we have a comprehensive system for monitoring and improving attendance. Every lesson, attendance is taken by the teacher and recorded on our KAMAR system. As a parent or caregiver you can check directly through the KAMAR Parent Portal to see the live entry of data. You can also check past attendance, results student timetables and the primary caregiver can also update personal and contact details. Letters have been sent home with login details. If you need a new copy please contact Tina in the office on 878 7139. If you are unable to check online you can ring the school office to confirm attendance.

Once attendance is marked in period one and two, text messages are sent out to the whanau of students who are marked absent if we have not had any notification about them being away. You are asked to reply to the text so we can update our records and ensure students are safe. You can help us by contacting the school if you know your student is going to be away. You can ring and leave a message on the school answerphone system, email the dean or send in a note with your son/daughter.

If you have told us about your son/daughter's reason for being absent we need to complete our records. There are some reasons that are considered 'Justified' by the school and the Ministry of Education. Being unwell is such a reason and will be recorded as a Justified Absence. If a student is absent due to illness and the absence exceeds three days we will require a medical certificate.
