

Reports ... then Benchmark Examinations

Reports for all students have now been sent home and uploaded to the KAMAR Portal. Please use the reports as an opportunity at home for discussion around next steps in their learning, both in the classroom and at home.

Benchmark Examinations, (practices for the end of year examinations where results are used if students are ill or otherwise not able to attend) and workshops (for courses with portfolios) will be held for most courses from 15 - 20 August. For some courses this is not timely and these will be held later in the year. It is VERY important that students prepare the best they possibly can for these. We will be open for Winter School on Monday 8 and Tuesday 9 July. Some students will be advised of their necessary attendance and a notification sent home. However any student is welcome to come in and use the facilities in the library for study.

Supporting students at home with study strategies throughout the year, not merely a few days or weeks prior to assessments, means preparation becomes a habit and success can become a reality. However, studying doesn't need to be boring, tough or lengthy though, in fact it can often be fun with using flashcards, pictorials, mindmaps or funny mnemonics or song lyrics to remember concepts. Caregivers can even help at home by providing a designated space for study that is quiet and free from distractions, well-lit and set up with a desk and a chair. Also encourage 'breaks' in study for exercise, family time/jobs, listening to music etc.

HEALTH NEWS - MEASLES

As you may be aware there are currently multiple outbreaks of measles in New Zealand and at least 140 confirmed cases reported so far in 2019. Measles is a serious, highly infectious viral disease that is easy to prevent through immunisation. If your child has had two doses of the Measles, Mumps and Rubella (MMR) immunisation they are protected.

As there is a high chance that measles could spread to Hawke's Bay, we urge you take the following steps to make sure your child is protected:

Check your child has had two doses of the MMR immunisation.

- o If your child only has a record of receiving one dose of MMR they should have another as soon as possible
- o If your child has no record of MMR immunisation they should have one dose now and a second dose FOUR weeks later.
- Immunisation is FREE from your GP or Practice Nurse.

Please make sure you have a copy of your child's immunisation certificate, so you can show this to their school if required. If your child has contact with a person with confirmed measles they may be asked to keep away from school for up to two weeks if there is no record of them having been immunised against MMR.

Immunisation is highly recommended as it protects your child and helps prevent the spread of infection in the community when an outbreak occurs. If you require further information, you can find out more from the Ministry of Health's website www.health.govt.nz/measles
