RACE UNITY SPEECH AWARDS

The Race Unity Speech Awards were initiated by the New Zealand Bahá'í Community in 2001 in support of Race Relations Day (21 March).

This year's speech topic was *Titiro whakamuri*, *kia anga whakamua* – *To face the future*, *look to the past*. Speakers were asked to draw on the past to set out their vision for the future of race relations in Aotearoa. As this is the 20th annual Race Unity Speech Awards, and much has been achieved in this time, yet we are more concerned about racism than ever before, speakers were asked 'What will the next 20 years hold for our nation?'

Students were asked to address at least two of the following questions in their speech:

- What can we learn from our ancestors and the leaders of the past about how to eradicate racial prejudice?
- How might we commemorate events in our past in a way that helps bring about justice and unity today?
- What do you think race relations in Aotearoa should look like 20 years from now, and what do we need to do now to secure this future?
- What do New Zealand's leaders and people of influence need to do to support young people in their efforts to improve race relations?

Several of our students joined in the two Hawke's Bay heats and we are very excited to share **Ondre Hapuku-Lambert** and **Ethin Templeton** won their respective heats. They both now progress to the semi-finals, then (hopefully!) the finals, to be held on 17 May.

We too are proud of Claire's accomplishments and wish her all the best as she continues to grow Mia Dolce. #ProudlyKaramu.


