- Optional review topics contain helpful supporting information but little or no school-specific content.

To start reviewing:

- 2. Enter the username (karamu) and password (knowledge).
- 3. Click on the link to the **Review topic** that has a P listed beside it.
- 4. Read the policy.
- 5. Click the Policy Review button at the top right-hand corner of the page.
- 6. Select the reviewer type (Parent/Caregiver).
- 7. Enter your name (optional).
- 8. Submit your ratings and comments.

DEPUTY PRINCIPAL - CURRICULUM



While it may feel the Academic year has started off in a flurry it has been done with careful planning for our Year 12 and 13 students. It was a pleasure to have the students and their whanau join Senior Deans to reflect on their past year's results discuss their career aspirations, set goals and confirm appropriate courses for this year. Being in appropriate courses, setting realistic but aspirational goals and knowing the pathways available to them are great stepping stones for exceptional personal success. To assist students, with achieving their goals, next week we will distribute to all senior students a NCEA Tracker fridge magnet. This useful tool allows you and your child to track their NCEA credits throughout the year.

Teachers have created courses that consider possible disruptions due to COVID, along with students' best interests in mind, that cater for ability, interest and pathways. It is therefore very important that all assessments and milestone deadlines be met by the due date. Every course has an assessment calendar. These documents are located on TEAMS and can be accessed at any time. If students are away from school, it is important that they communicate with their teachers via TEAMS or email. This way their teachers can support them with learning remotely and discuss milestone and assessment deadlines.

Homework should also be a regular event for all high school students. Students will not succeed to their true potential unless they are actively going over their work between lessons and checking their understanding. There is no such statement as "I have no homework tonight". Homework can mean summarising key points into an exercise book or onto flash cards explaining the key points. Information retention drops significantly within the first 24 hours unless a student makes the time to process the learning.

Year 9 and 10 students have the added opportunity to make these activities habits before they move into the years of NCEA.

Kia ora Whanau,

It is great to see the excitement of the students heading off in the afternoon either walking, biking or catching the bus home. It is important to remember that they are expected to follow the expectations of our school for the trip home. The correct wearing of uniform, crossing in a safe and mature fashion if walking and following the expectations of the bus driver if that is their preferred mode of transport. I would encourage parents to check if their child is riding to have a helmet on to and from school and that their bike is locked at school. We have a number of bikes not locked up and the bike racks are visible from the public roads that surround the school.

I am pleased with the number of students bringing their laptops to school to engage in the learning required in their subjects. If for any reason your child needs to borrow a laptop due to a fault we can lend them a laptop in the short term. They just need to come and see me. We encourage students to manage themselves and bringing their laptops fully charged to school is their responsibility. By now all year 9 and 10 students should have returned their ICT user agreement to their Mentor teacher.

All the year 9 students have had an induction into the use of technology at Karamu high school. This induction also included the technical as well as the social expectations of connecting and communication online. We also introduced them to the use of teams for accessing their learning both at school and at home. I would encourage parents to be engaged, ask to see how it works and monitor the use of technology at home where possible. We have had a positive response to our phone use changes and it is starting to become embedded into the school culture.

'Tira Ora' is the name given to the branchlet of the Karamu tree, so an ideal name for branchlets or students of Karamu. Here we share the journey of one of our Tira Ora

Neville (Joe) Coughlan (Attended 2003 - 2007)

In 2007 Joe was already reaching for the stars as Head Boy and Student Representative on the Board of Trustees, but picked up a passion for science at Karamu that has stayed with him ever since.

"I think I enjoy scientific research because I am a curious person. Despite the frustrations and failures that are nearly always a part of the scientific process, I find it deeply satisfying to crack a problem open and understand why something happens."

Upon leaving school Joe went to the University of Waikato to complete a Bachelor of Science (completed with 1st Class Honors) before heading over to the University of Melbourne for his Doctor of Philosophy in research involving the measurement of how retinal (the molecule responsible for human vision) changes shape when it absorbs light. It was soon after a move to the UK with his partner (now very proudly his wife) saw him start a postdoc at the University of Oxford. He was there for about 18 months working on low-temperature physics projects, laser-cooling trapped ions to measure chemical reactions at very low temperatures near absolute zero degrees. He was then offered a postdoctoral position at the University of Waterloo, Ontario. He worked here for three years, but after his first year was awarded a Vanier-Banting fellowship (Valued at over \$140000) to pursue a proposed research program involving mass spectrometry, laser spectroscopy, and machine learning for drug discovery.



He has since been awarded two further substantial grants and co-authored research on Detection and unambiguous characterization of peptides post-digestion of SARS-CoV-2 spoke proteins. He has a very strong publication record with over 20 peer-reviewed articles in international journals, over 20 conference contributions and several cover article illustrations (including the front cover graphic of the Canadian Journal of Physics in 2020).

While at the University of Waterloo his supervisor (Scott Hopkins) founded a company called WaterMine Innovation Inc., which is a start-up company that delivers machine learning solutions for scientific challenges. To give an example, if a pesticide company is looking for a new/better pesticide to sell to their customers, WaterMine can streamline that process by using machine learning to search through chemical databases and find suitable candidates. After leaving Waterloo, Scott said he wanted to step back from the company to focus on research, so Joe was offered the position of CEO, of which he has held since mid 2021.

Joe attributes his mum as the biggest influencer in his life. "She is selfless, supportive, and kind, and has done so much for me to get me where I am today. I often think of Mum when I think of the kind of person I want to be".

Joe also fondly remembers his final year at Karamu when the manager at Cornwall Cricket Club (David Black, also a KHS alumni) convinced him that it would be a good idea to participate in one of the courses at Outward Bound. Recalling a need to raise about \$2500 to go, Joe went about knocking on doors and asking various people for money. Several bodies ended up contributing for no reason other than sheer generosity, including the Rotary Club, Cornwall Cricket Club, the Black family, and Karamu High School. Joe is immensely grateful for everyone's generosity, remembers it very fondly and believes that course helped shape him as the person he is today.



FOOD AT SCHOOL

We pride ourselves on being a water and milk only school. No fizzy drinks or energy drinks are sold on site or to be brought to school. Our canteen sells a selection of healthy food options as well as a selection of treat foods.

We offer a Breakfast Club every Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday morning 8-8.30am in TEC 3. This is provided by the school for anyone that has early morning training, arrives at school early or just wants a warm place to meet with friends for cereal or toast. It is hosted by a teacher or a teacher aide so if students have homework they have support to finish that too. We are very thankful for the support we receive from KidsCan and Hastings New World.

We have a small selection of lunch packs available for students that need lunch as well. Students can approach any Deputy Principal for this support. Because of our drive for healthy food options and the logistics in managing over 900 students at lunchtime we ask students not to have food delivered to school by commercial outlets (ie: Pizza delivery, UBEReats etc). If parents need to drop food off they should do so to the Office and we will get a message sent to your child indicating it is available to pick up.

FREE PERIOD PRODUCTS

A new initiative in 2021 was that all schools in the country have free period products available. Products are available at the Library, the nurse and sickbay for girls to get two packets of pads or tampons every month. They can help themselves at anytime, including break, lunchtime or before or after school to get their supplies. They shouldn't be shy periods are natural. Period.
