PINK SHIRT DAY

On Friday 20 May we supported the Mental Health Foundation, by encouraging students to wear pink and purchase additional food for sale at break and lunchtime, to recognise the international movement "Kōrero Mai, Kōrero Atu, Mauri Tū, Mauri Ora – Speak Up, Stand Together, Stop Bullying!", known more commonly as 'Pink Shirt Day'.

The student council hoped to not only raise funds to support this cause but also provide an opportunity to raise awareness of the 'Pink Shirt' movement. Celebrated annually around the globe, Pink Shirt Day began in Canada in 2007 when two students took a stand against homophobic bullying, after a peer was bullied for wearing a pink shirt.

In Aotearoa, Pink Shirt Day works to create schools, workplaces, communities and whānau where everyone feels safe, valued and respected regardless of age, sex, gender identity, sexual orientation, ability, or cultural background.

As a school we have often rallied together to raise funds, for similar charities, including I am Hope. It was great to see staff and students get behind this charity and over \$1,000 was raised.

Term 2 is a busy term for our senior students with a strong focus on working towards their personal goals, including gaining credits from their internal assessments. Students that balance a healthy mind and body with regular exercise also thrive.

Grant Porteous (1984-89)

When at school Grant had a passion for rugby, avidly remembered by Mr Wooster as walking between classes with a ball being casually tossed in the air. He and his family participated in a huge range of sports from snow skiing, to water skiing, played to representative level in soccer, hockey, rugby and competed in equestrian to national level. He believes sport taught him many things, as well as reinforced learnings from his parents: like working hard, to never give up, that coming second is okay if you gave everything you had on the day and to go back and prepare and practice more to be better. We should not step backward to anyone or any opportunity, physical size is not a measure, but the size of your ticker (heart) defines you. We can be self-reliant, however, to be part of a great team is so rewarding, and great teams



comprise team first people, with strong values. And while confident in their ability, to have enduring success are very humble. And when you give everything you have to a team, its more rewarding than when you do for self.

His passion for sport was closely followed by another, for building, and therefore not surprising he is now the Managing Director at G J Gardner Homes. G J Gardner Homes were recognised, through independent research, as the 'Most Trusted Home Builders' in New Zealand in 2019. They have won that award, voted for by consumers since its inception, 7 years in a row now. They are New Zealand's largest builder, 3.5 times over the next builder, building over \$800m in new housing (excluding land) every year. A formidable achievement for 30 family-owned businesses. Grant is immensely proud of what he has achieved in life with his wife, not just in business or as parents (of 4 daughters) and the fantastic experiences they have had. He shares "For us we are proud we have done so by our own hard work, determination, and resilience. And importantly, creating a business that is revered for its values and positive culture, not just its market leadership in size. Plus taking the step to self-employment from strong corporate careers also takes courage, including the courage to ignore well-meaning friends or colleagues who I call unintentional 'dream killers' - whose caring advice can be of the like "is it's too risky, you've got a great corporate career, is now the right time" etc - be careful of caring 'dream killers' in your life."

Combining Grant's two passions G.J. Gardner have always had close alliances with sport and last year the National Basketball League welcomed G.J. Gardner Homes as the Presenting Partner of the men's competition for the next three years. Grant stated "G.J. Gardner Homes are great supporters of sport from the main stage right down to the grass roots and club levels. At G.J.'s we believe in the value of sports. Not only for what it teaches us on the court, but for the values it can inspire off it." We have seen G.J.'s as supporters of many sports, including officials as well as major codes such as rugby league.

In September 2021 G.J.'s began building its 20,000th family home, in Ngāruawāhia, a feat that's equivalent to the size of many New Zealand towns. Grant and his wife Ellie, watched on Zoom from lockdown in Auckland as the concrete slab was poured for the new home. They are immensely proud to be the largest home builder in the country across 31 franchises, but "We never set out to be the biggest home builder in New Zealand," Grant says. "Our ongoing goal is to be a great business, with good family values like keeping our promises, and respecting everyone from customers to trade partners to the people in the supply chain."

While Grant has had considerable time in the building industry, his corporate career spanned many industry sectors. He shares he had no plan on leaving school and "so don't be pressured if you don't know the career path you want. Get a good education, work hard to stand out from the crowd, take good opportunities and it will evolve". He believes a good education provides opportunity, add life skills, experience, courage and a hard work ethos and you have a good recipe for success.

Prior to his time at G.J.'s Grant was Business Development Manager at Placemakers and Business Unit Manager at Carter Holt Harvey.

He shares some wonderful thoughts for our students:

- My view is it sits better with you when you can wear the tee shirt "tried & failed, rather than never tried" So step up and have a go. You can't always turn the clock back on missed opportunities. I hate the phrases 'maybe... could have been, should have been, if only".
- As a person, or in business, don't strive to be perfect. Do the little things well, they all add up to big things.
- Self-reflection/evaluation is not weakness. It's a great skill, to spend a little time thinking what you could have done differently to get a better result, or outcome, be honest with yourself and say, heck I got that very wrong it's how we learn.
- Only respect the opinions of people you respect. And if they tell you you're getting it wrong listen.
- And a great learning he has acted on to improve his own happiness....

What you say to yourself, when you are by yourself, about yourself, are the most important words you will speak
