MATARIKI

For our inaugural New Zealand public holiday, Matariki on Friday 24 June, it was exciting in the week beginning 20 June to celebrate our Matariki cluster and Māori new year. The week started with in class learning focus over Monday and Tuesday, then on Wednesday workshops offered our tauira a taste of several elements of te ao Māori.

These workshops were led by local mātanga in their fields, Solomon Blake ngā Mahi a Rēhia, Tori Houkamau ngā Mahi Toi, Lucky Morete instructed our tauira in the art of mau rākau (Māori weaponry) and Pikihoru Stewart spoke of the origins of poi and instructed students on how to make poi.

On Wednesday evening, Matua Rawiri and Kōkā Sharlena worked with our senior tauira to prepare our hāngī that was held the following morning. It was lovely to have a number of staff, students and whanau join us during the evening (especially the senior photography class) and in the morning to celebrate Matariki and to acknowledge those close to us who have passed (to acknowledge the star Pohutukawa).

At Karamu High School whanaungatanga is our first value and we express it as the:

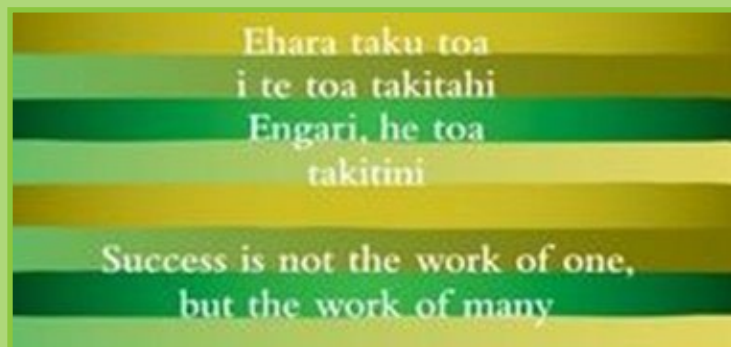
- Positive relationships we hold between staff, students, whanau and visitors;

It is our power of working together here at Karamu that should make us extremely Proudly Karamu. I want us all to work together to get rubbish in bins, call out those we suspect of poor behavior anywhere in our school and reclaim our kura as a place of respect.

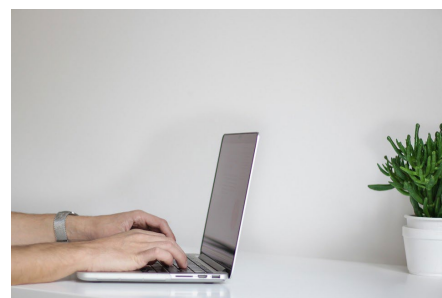
Reviews are open to board, staff, and parents/caregivers/whānau.

QUEEN'S BIRTHDAY HONOURS

We were very proud to have our Board of Trustees Chairman Mr Dave de Lange recognized in the Queen's Birthday and Platinum Jubilee Honours.

He became a Member of the New Zealand Order of Merit (MNZM) for services to the New Zealand Police and the community. Mr de Lange was a uniformed officer for about a decade before joining the CIB and, having been appointed Detective Senior Sergeant in charge of the Hastings CIB in 2006, has overseen investigations of some of Hawke's Bay's major crimes, particularly in Hastings and including homicides, serious assaults and sexual offending.

He had four years as leader of the Eastern Police District child protection team and is currently head of the district's organised crime team.

But it's been a career of much more than helping to uphold the law and playing rugby for the Magpies, police teams, and New Zealand Combined Services – and Waipukurau HSOB and Hastings Celtic, names which have passed into history.

Mr de Lange also had 22 years in school board governance, including being chairperson of the Mayfair School board from 1998 to 2003 and a member of Karamu High School Board from 2004 to 2020, including 12 years as our Chairperson.

SPORT NZ VOICE OF RANGATAHI SURVEY

Sport Hawke's Bay will soon be circulating an online survey with secondary school students across the region. We are very lucky to have been selected as a school to be surveyed. Sport NZ wish to share with whanau information about the survey:

Why are we surveying Rangatahi (Young People)?

Young people are important to us, and experiences during secondary school years can inspire or discourage a life-long involvement in physical activity. We want to ensure that rangatahi have great sport, physical activity and active recreation experiences at school and the more you know about a population group, the better placed you are to provide opportunities and experiences that meet their needs, ultimately supporting a lifelong love of being active - we need to be making decisions that are informed by the audience who we are looking to cater for.

Why will the survey be in schools?

We want to find out what more can be done to support schools and teachers, and link schools to sport and recreation organisations in their communities. We are targeting secondary schools from across the country, so we have information from a cross-section of rangatahi across New Zealand. We want to survey all secondary school students and school is the best place to reach young people.

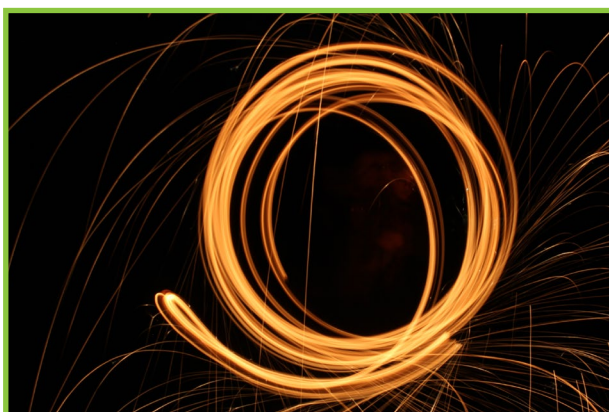
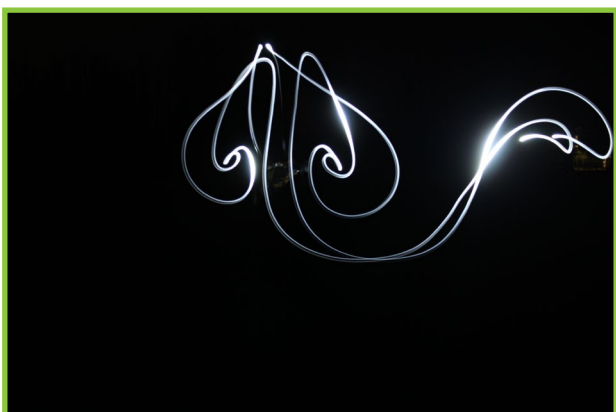
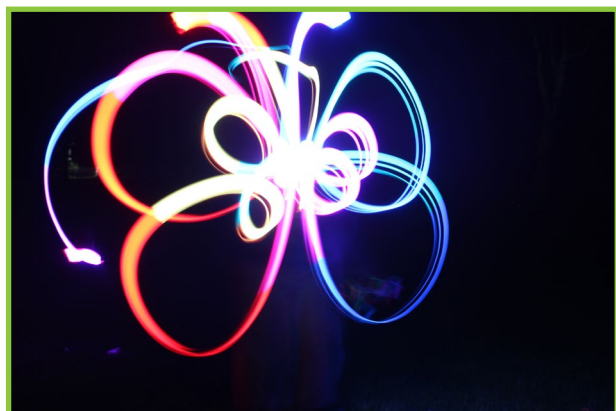
Do schools have a say in how and when the survey is administered?

Yes. The survey is circulated to students and is completed online. It is up to the school as to when and where the survey is completed. The survey has been set up, so it is easy for schools and students to take part at a time which is convenient for them.

Data Protection

Students will have their say but will not be identifiable down to the individual level. There is a section at the end of the survey that asks participants to voluntarily provide their name, date of birth and postcode. These details will enable the responses to be combined with other data held by Sport NZ and/or other agencies (e.g. Statistics NZ), but will be removed once this is done (i.e. individuals will not be able to be identified).
