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CYCLONE GABRIELLE

However, we now know this wasn't the case for everyone, Cyclone Gabrielle claiming several Karamu community members houses. Staff, students and whānau were also affected both physically and mentally by the devastation.

However, in times of need our vision of Proudly Hastings kicks in. The head student leaders straight away volunteering at the Hastings Sports Centre Evacuation Centre, then a wider group of Year 13's (pictured below) headed out to help in homes devastated by the cyclone and staff also helped with their time and kind at the SPCA, the evacuation centres and with chainsawing trees for neighbours and cleaning homes full of silt. Many other students helped at their churches and in neighbourhoods.

As a school we helped with giving food and one of our school vans to the Waipatu Marae.

The best way to predict your future is to create it



EDUCATION REVIEW OFFICE (ERO) REPORT

Te Ara Huarau is the evaluation approach that the Education Review Office (ERO) is using in our school. This is a developmental approach to evaluation where ERO and our school work together over time rather than one off reviews that happened previously. Te Ara Huarau is used in most English-medium state and state-integrated schools.

ERO maintains a regular review programme to evaluate and report on the education and care of young people in schools. Our school worked alongside ERO to write our Profile Report. This type of report will only happen once as part of our initial engagement with Te Ara Huarau. The profile report reflects our strategic goals and a shared evaluation focus on one or more areas that are important to us as we work together to improve outcomes for all our learners. ERO, like us, have a strong focus on equity and excellence. Future reporting will show our progress and achievement towards meeting the goals we have set. Public reports like the Profile Report are published on <u>ERO's website</u>.

A Board Assurance Report that shows how we are meeting regulatory and legislative requirements has also been published. Included in our bundle of published reports is a Provision for International Students report.

POLICY REVIEW

In 2023, all schools will review the Legislation and Administration section and the Curriculum and Student Achievement section (including EOTC and Learning). All reviews are open to board, staff, students, and the school community (parents/caregivers/whānau).

DEPUTY PRINCIPAL - CURRICULUM

Kia Ora Whānau,

As we move into recovery in many areas of the region, it is important to support our young people back into education as this supports community recovery and our rangatahi to get back to some sort of normality.

Prior to the destructive cyclone hitting our region, we met with our Year 12 and 13 students and their whanau to reflect on their past year's results, discuss their career aspirations, set goals and confirm appropriate courses for this year. Being in appropriate courses, setting realistic but aspirational goals and knowing the pathways available to them are great stepping stones for exceptional personal success.

As we reflect on our results from last year, students can feel satisfied if they have achieved their personal excellence, but I do often hear students, parents and teachers reflecting on the following:

- Poor benchmark results;
- Poor time management; or
- Low attendance.

Research shows that students with over 90% attendance have a much greater chance of success. So if you and your child are serious about achieving the goals they have set themselves this year then the hard work needs to start now. This includes being at school or online on the school Teams platform, being attentive in class, being aware of assessments and completing them on time and to the best of their ability.

Teachers have created courses with students' best interests in mind, that cater for ability, interest and pathways. It is therefore very important that all assessments and milestone deadlines be met by the due date. Experience tells us that these tasks generally take much longer than a student thinks they will.

Year 9 and 10 students have the added opportunity to make these activities habits before they move into the years of NCEA.

At the time of writing, our Year 11 - 13 students are rostered home and those staff who have access to the internet will be uploading learning for students via our online system Microsoft-Teams. This is obviously not a priority for those families without power or internet access. For those students who are able, please encourage them to go online and start to work through the learning their teachers have set for them.

Our thoughts are with you all during these challenging times.

Kia ora Karamu whānau,



I was heartened by your strength and resilience when speaking or messaging our community following the state of emergency over the past week. It was great to see that our students stepped up to support the community and at times the No.8 wire approach to communicating coming into action.

It is usually only when an event like this happens that we start to reflect on some of the planning that could have been done in hindsight. It is important that we know as soon as possible if our students have moved residence so we can update our systems and that we have any contact details including numbers and email addresses updated. Please contact the office if this applies to you.

At times our students will need to have remote access to their learning and fortunately we had been starting to support some of our whānau with laptops where needed. If you need support with this, students can still pick up a letter from the office and return the signed copy to be issued with a school laptop. We do use them at school as a tool for learning, so it is also important that they bring their laptops charged and ready for the day.

The Year 9 students completed an induction on how to access their Microsoft accounts and TEAMS (online classroom) during their induction week during Week 2 of the year.

At the end of the day we have continued to stagger the exit of students and this has made a big difference to the foot and car traffic at the end of the day. We do however have issues with the exit from Beatson Road and visability due to the bus stop being so close to the exit. ALL traffic from Beatson Road should turn left. If this isn't ideal then using the parking along Grove Road would be best.

Our student timetables are now at a point where all our students are settled into their classes. If there are any questions please do contact me or your child's year level Dean.

Welcome back to the 2023 school year and a special acknowledgment to new staff and students. I hope you have felt the same manaaki in your first couple of weeks, as I experienced when I started late last year.

My heart goes out to all those that were affected by the recent extreme weather events in the region. This is a particularly difficult period for many families, so if you need support, please reach out to the school.

The Pastoral Care Team have been busy over the first few weeks of the year to make sure that our Year 9 cohort settle into high school life as soon as possible. Our mission is to help make the transition smooth, so all students feel comfortable to be at Karamu High School.

Maintaining our high uniform expectations has been another focus for the beginning of the year. The Senior Leadership Team have consulted with both staff and a select group of students and have agreed to the following changes for 2023:

- Hair is to be tidy, of a natural colour and long hair must be tied back for health and safety reasons.
- Facial hair should be tidy and groomed.
- Earrings: students may have no more than two studs or sleepers in each ear (the size being no bigger than a hole punch).
- Students may have one small nose stud. No other facial or visible body or tongue piercings are permitted.
- One neck taonga (pounamu, bone carvings, religious attire) are permitted.
- No other jewellery i.e: bracelets, anklets, rings etc may be worn, however the principal will consider special requests.
- Only natural coloured make-up including nail polish, eye shadow, eye liner and foundation are permitted.

Wanda Douglas (Attended 1984 - 1988)

When Wanda left at the end of 1988, the world was destined for a great young woman such as her. Having been Head Girl, she was academically capable, an enthusiastic sportswoman, and a genuinely warm and outgoing individual.

She studied at Massey University (Palmerston North), completing a Bachelor of Arts, and a Master of Arts (Honours) in Psychology which included a thesis in the area of health psychology; she then returned to Hawke's Bay to work for a year as a social worker with the (then) Children and Young Persons' Service.

In 1995 Wanda enlisted in the Royal New Zealand Air Force, where she achieved her registration as a Psychologist and served for 7 ½ years. Wanda is most proud of completing Basic and Officer Training within the RNZAF – she enjoyed the unique opportunities she experienced during those six months, the physical and mental challenges and the long-lasting friendships that were established and still exist to this day. Post-training, deploying to places like East Timor, and the UK, and truly being part of a national effort to help and support others were highlights of her Air Force career. She was the Director of Psychology for half of her time in the RNZAF, before leaving to work in the corporate world of Hewlett Packard in human resources, then as a consulting psychologist / executive coach with a small boutique Auckland business. At that time, there was no territorial RNZAF force, so she switched to serving with the NZ Army and has been a Reservist Military Psychologist since 2002.

In 2010 she came back to settle in Napier and created her own business, Wands Psychology Services. Her work includes executive/management coaching, professional supervision, and EAP counselling with individuals. She delivers a range of workshops from leadership and emotional intelligence through to resilience and change management, and all in between! She has worked in sports psychology for nearly 10 years in the mental skills/performance psychology space, with a range of organisations that currently include the HB Rugby Football Union, High Performance Sport NZ, Hockey Manawatu/Hockey NZ, Tennis Eastern, and Sport Gisborne Tairawhiti.

Her connection with her whanau has always been important to Wanda, and her values are drawn from her engagements with those close to her – these values include kindness, integrity, honesty, fun and hard work. Her friends too are massively important, ex-Karamu friends as well as friends from university and from her time in the military - especially when times get tough! She fondly remembers teachers also making a huge difference to her choices in life - "those who fed my curiosity and were positive role models for life and future learning gave me the confidence to continue in my fields of interest".

Asking Wanda what led her to get involved in her area of success, she shared, interestingly, up until the middle of her last year at Karamu, she wanted to either do Physical Education and be a PE teacher, or study science (biochemistry). What changed that was when Karamu High School invited a speaker to school, Dr Steven Saunders, who was a Registered Psychologist – she found him fascinating to listen to, how he framed concepts like how to cope with stress and manage mindsets, and she thought, "I'd be keen to know more about all that!"

In hindsight, she had always had an interest in what makes people tick, and how we can be the best version of ourselves, and her more recent work as a mental skills coach has honed her focus around high performance, resilience, and wellbeing. Outside of work, Wanda's family are her foundation - her husband Marcus, her two lovely boys Jakob and Connor, and their tonkinese cat, Major! She loves the outdoors, especially the beach, so we may find her exploring in their camper-trailer, setting off on walks, with therapeutic sounds going on or curled up reading, either fiction or non-fiction (particularly autobiographies). *#ProudlyKaramu*
