
Don't let the results and outcomes of the past define who you are — it's what you do now and moving forward that will define who you are going to be.

DEPUTY PRINCIPAL - CURRICULUM

Kia ora e te whānau

Academically all students have been busy this term. Year 9 and 10 have had a series of tests which provide us with a range of data to enable us to see how to best help them learn and Year 11 - 13 have started their NCEA journeys.

In order for Year 11 - 13 students to achieve their goals they need a number of mechanisms in place:

- Consistent attendance
- Focus in class
- Sustained completion of classroom tasks and homework
- Meeting all milestones and assessment due dates
- Clear lines of communication with their teachers

You as whānau can track senior student milestones and assessments on our school website under the academic section or ask your child to show you their individual course outlines on Microsoft TEAMS.

Also on our website are a series of useful documents including:

- NCEA for Parents and Students
- **Extension Forms**
- **Appeals**
- NCEA Exam Timetable for 2024

Students, who for very legitimate reasons, cannot meet deadlines (bereavement, illness or injury) should complete the extension form with evidence of their work and take it to their teacher to apply for an extension. Milestones are used to check that students understand the assessment and are ready to move to the next phase, and check authenticity/academic honesty.

Students who do not meet the milestones will be required to catch up their work in the Homework Centre/Period 6 after school. Students who are behind at the end of each term will be required to attend school during the holidays to catch up.

Kia ora e te whānau,


It has been a great start to the year with our students now settled into their studies. It has been amazing to work with students who had clashes with their timetables, their maturity, patience and positivity as we worked through the first two weeks in balancing classes and sorting out clashes.

Once again we are at capacity and most courses are well into the term study. Students will have a course outline that has been posted through their TEAMS app and this is the main portal for students to access their work. We have been overwhelmed with requests for laptops and unfortunately some students are waiting to access a device. We do have access to computers at school so they will not miss out when at school. If you have borrowed a device but are now able to purchase or attain one the return and redistribution of that laptop would be greatly appreciated.

Our Mahi class, one hour a week for the senior school is well underway. Our Year 11 and 12 started by completing a CV, which they can draw on at any time to update and to use for applying for a few hours work a week. They have now moved onto their driving units with the Year 11 students who are on average 15 and a half years having time to practice towards their learner licence. This includes a self-paced online road code, practice tests and the support of their peers as they work through it.

I have been greatly reassured by the positive approach to the time available and the excitement and engagement by our students. Year 12 can either study towards their learners or start to work towards their restricted. Year 13 have been engaged in workshops around flatting, eating healthy while living independently, finance and relationships.

DEPUTY PRINCIPAL - STUDENT MANAGEMENT

Kia ora e te whānau

Welcome back to the 2024 school year and a special acknowledgement to new staff and students. I hope you have felt the same manaaki in your first couple of weeks, as I experienced when I started in late 2022.

The pastoral care team have been busy over the first few weeks of the year to make sure that our Year 9 cohort settle into high school life as soon as possible. Our mission is to help make the transition smooth, so all

students feel comfortable to be at Karamū High School.

Overall, I am pleased to see students responding well to the new cell phone guidelines. New regulations set out by the Ministry of Education require students to not use their phones while they are attending school (including breaks). Students can bring their phone to school, but it is important that they turn it off and place it in their bag. If students make the decision to have their cell phone out during the school day, they run the risk of having it confiscated.

Maintaining our high uniform expectations has been another focus for the beginning of the year. Here is a reminder of our uniform requirements:

- Hair is to be tidy, of a natural colour and long hair must be tied back for health and safety reasons.
- Facial hair should be tidy and groomed.
- Earrings: students may have no more than two studs or sleepers in each ear (the size being no bigger than a hole punch).
- Students may have one small nose stud. No other facial or visible body or tongue piercings are permitted.
- One neck taonga (pounamu, bone carvings, religious attire) are permitted
- No other jewellery i.e: bracelets, anklets, rings etc may be worn, however the principal will consider special requests.
- Only natural coloured make-up including nail polish, eye shadow, eye liner and foundation are permitted.

SCHOOL DOCS

At Karamū High School we use School Docs for our school Policies, Procedures and Guidelines.

All parents can login to SchoolDocs to view these at any time using these login details:

- 2. Enter the username (karamu) and password (knowledge).

The SchoolDocs site is organised into sections that reflect operational requirements for schools. The table of contents shows the key policy for each section, with dropdown menus that show supporting policies and procedures.

For a list of important policies and procedures, search for Quick Links topics designed for school staff, and parents and whānau.

There are two main ways to find information on your SchoolDocs site, using the search and the table of contents.

Search

- 1. Type a keyword or phrase into the search bar and press enter or click the search icon.
- View the search results and click a topic or document to see the content. 2.
- Click Close Search to see where the topic fits into the table of contents. 3.

Table of Contents

- 4. Click the arrow icon beside any topic to expand the table of contents and see related policies and procedures.
- 5. Click the down arrow icon to collapse a section and return to an overview of the table
- 6. To collapse the table of contents and return to the home page, click the SchoolDocs logo, or refresh your browser.

NCEA ASSEMBLY

On Friday 23 February we recognised 2023 NCEA course and level endorsements, as well as NZQA Scholarships and our top achievers in Year, 11, 12 and 13.

Over 50 Merit, and over 20 Excellence, Level Endorsements were awarded to our current Year 12 and 13 students.

For Level 3, Olivia Thomas (Year 13 in 2023) was awarded both the Karamū High School Cup for Level Three Humanities and the Karamū High School Arts and Humanities Scholarship for Tertiary Study for gaining Excellence course endorsements for Media Studies & English and History endorsed with Merit.

2023 deputy head Esta Chaplin received the Karamū High School Cup for the Best NCEA Level 3 results, which included Level Endorsed with Excellence and Business Studies, Design and History courses endorsed with Excellence.

2023 Year 11 student Nina Palik received the Karamū High School Cup for the Best NCEA Level One results, this included Excellence course endorsements in English, History, Japanese and Merit endorsements in Science and Mathematics with Algebra.
