We have continued in 2022 to have incredible staff here at Karamu that value relationships equally beside educational outcomes. Our staff are committed both inside and outside the classroom to providing students with opportunities to grow and develop in new activities like mau rakau to Dungeons and Dragons, performing on the stage, whether in our Pasifika groups, or in big spectacles like Showquest. Our incredible support staff also work tirelessly to ensure that the students are well supported to be the best they can - whether that be in the classroom, at the office or in the grounds.

We continue to be grateful for the support our school receives from our whānau. The role whānau play in a child's education will always be critical to their success. While you may not



This year I would also like to acknowledge the engagement and participation of the student body. 2022 has been challenging with rostering home and illness - both of students and of staff. Resilience has been tested, but students have often risen to the challenge. Our student leaders Jack Arcus, Sasha Sharma, Jordyn Nicholson, and Rory McKay lead a passionate group of ākonga fulfilling our school vision and values. I wish those leaving school in 2022 all the very best and look forward to seeing your ongoing success in the future. We know you leave the safety of Karamu having the resilience and fortitude to challenge your limits.

There have been many 'Proudly Karamu' moments this year, but none more so than two at the end of Term 3. The first was our 60th celebration. We had over 100 Tira Ora, that attended here in the 1960s, return. The event provided an opportunity for people to look at memorabilia, have official year level photos taken, and reconnect with former peers. Tours of the school showcased its development over the years and connected past pupils with those currently attending. When Karamu High School opened in 1962 for third formers, it had a school roll of 169 – 106 girls, 63 boys and nine staff. There was merely the Technology Block for teaching with six classrooms and the corner of Windsor Park for recreation. Now, 60 years on, the school roll is consistently above 900 and the whole school has virtually been re-built. A transformation so many could not

My second 'Proudly Karamu' moment was of course Mr Wooster's community, student and whanau that allowed us to warmly welcome a large contingent, both in person and online, to a stunning student-centered event, including drama, Pasifika, music, and kapa haka performances. So many took the opportunity to celebrate, acknowledge and tautoko this wonderful man for all he has given our students, whanau and the school over his 40+ years of service. It was an amazing afternoon that reminded me of what we have to be grateful for.

I give my thanks to a wonderful team that had been in the waka with me this year, firstly the three Acting DPs Mrs Crawford, Mr Blake, and Mr Cummins – to fill the shoes of Mr Wooster took mana and energy and all three of you did more than was asked repeatedly. Ngā mihi nui. To Ms Gunn, Mr Hollands and Mrs Hantler, an immense thankyou to you as always for your patience and humility for your support, mahi and fortitude.



# PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Tena Koutou, the school year got off to a terrible start with long-time staff member and deputy principal Mr Wayne Wooster suffering a stroke. Mr Wooster was hospitalised as a result and has had a lengthy period of recovery. Mr Wooster has made considerable progress since then but elected to retire from teaching after 44 years dedicated service to Karamu.

Mr Wooster was farewelled at two functions, one student lead which was well organised by the student's and proved to be an entertaining event attended by many and live streamed to a huge number of former students, staff, and whānau. The other function was attended by Mr Wooster's colleagues, family, and friends. Both functions acknowledged Mr Wooster's contribution to Karamu, its students, staff, whānau, and the community.

It was a fitting tribute that the school gymnasium was named after Mr Wooster, the Wayne Wooster Gymnasium. It was also great to see the introduction of a new award at prizegiving after a former student donated a cup to be presented, the "Wooster Leadership Cup". I have no doubt this will become a highly sort after and prestigious award.

With Mr Wooster not at Karamu the senior leadership team, and all the staff stepped up to ensure the students school year wasn't disrupted by Mr Wooster's absence and the students got an excellent start to the year with a pōwhiri to welcome new students to Karamu.

It was great to see so many ex-students and staff attend Mr Wooster's farewell, hopefully these people stay connected to Karamu through the Tira Ora Alumni Association and strengthen the bond between the school and community, current and past students.

Again, Covid impacted the school year. Staff and students showed considerable resilience around restrictions as they chopped and changed to meet demand. This was a difficult year, when after several years we all hoped we were over Covid restrictions and disruptions. It wasn't quite the case, maybe in 2023.

The students have continued to achieve with the 2021 results placing Karamu above the national average and above the average of similar schools across all 3 NCEA levels. An outstanding result the students and all staff can be proud of.

Absenteeism remains an issue across all schools in New Zealand. The impact of Covid hasn't helped, but school attendance has been trending down since 2015 with less than 60% of students attending school regularly. Karamu and all schools are working hard to turn this around. To put it simply coming to school gives you an education, it develops social skills with other students and staff which enables students to begin their journey in the community once they finish school. This is in whatever they choose to do, tertiary, trade, travel, or any other direction they choose. So please support

your children's opportunities through education, make sure they get to school and engage with learning.

Karamu supports development of the students in many ways. This starts in Year 9 at the pōwhiri, and

continues throughout their time at Karamu through varied education and course options, sports, cultural events, workshops, activities, and challenges that grow and enable our young people

The last few years has really seen the school student leaders and fellow students step up around student lead activity, be it fund-raising, sports events, cultural or community events to really live Proudly Karamu, Proudly Hastings, Proudly Learning.

2022 also saw the Board of Trustee elections with board members Jonathan Brookes and Tanya Douglas standing down. Two new candidates were successful through the election process, Tineka Tuala-Fata and and Grant Russell who will join returning board members David de Lange, Jonathan Marks and Nic Richards. I offer my sincere thanks to the departing and current Board members for their service to Karamu who along with dedicated leaders, teachers and support staff ensure Karamu remains a secondary school of choice in Hawkes Bay.

Mr Troy England was also welcomed to Karamu in Term 4 when he joined us as deputy principal. Mr England, originally from Hawkes Bay was previously deputy principal at Papakura High School and will no doubt bring his own leadership style to our school.

Another hectic year has been ticked off, hopefully everyone enjoys a break over summer and our students and staff refresh ready for next year and those who are leaving succeed in their chosen path.














# TIRA ORA 2022

'Tira Ora' is the name given to the branchlet of the Karamu tree, so an ideal name for branchlets or students of Karamu. Here we share the journeys of some of our Tira Ora.....



### Neville (Joe) Coughlan (Attended 2003 –2007)

Upon leaving school Joe went to the University of Waikato to complete a Bachelor of Science (completed with 1st Class Honors) before heading over to the University of Melbourne for his Doctor of Philosophy in research involving the measurement of how retinal (the molecule responsible for human vision) changes shape when it absorbs light. It was soon after a move to the UK with his partner (now very proudly his wife) saw him start a postdoc at the University of Oxford. He was there for about 18 months working on low-temperature physics projects, laser-cooling trapped ions to measure chemical reactions at very low temperatures near absolute zero degrees. He was then offered a postdoctoral position at the University of Waterloo, Ontario. He worked here for three years, but after his first year was awarded a Vanier-Banting fellowship (valued at over \$140000) to pursue a proposed research program involving mass spectrometry, laser spectroscopy, and machine learning for drug discovery.

While at the University of Waterloo his supervisor (Scott Hopkins) founded a company called WaterMine Innovation Inc., which is a start-up company that delivers machine learning solutions for scientific challenges. After leaving Waterloo, Joe was offered the position of CEO, of which he has held since mid 2021.



# Grant Porteous (Attended 1984-89)

When at school Grant had a passion for rugby, avidly remembered by Mr. Wooster as walking between classes with a ball being casually tossed in the air. He and his family participated in a vast range of sports from snow skiing, to waterskiing, played to representative level in soccer, hockey, rugby and competed in equestrian to national level. His passion for sport was closely followed by another, for building, and therefore not surprising he is now the managing director at G J Gardner Homes. G J Gardner Homes were recognized, through independent research, as the 'Most Trusted Home Builders' in New Zealand in 2019. They have won that award, voted for by consumers since its inception, seven years in a row now. They are New Zealand's largest builder, 3.5 times over the next builder, building over \$800m in new housing (excluding land) every year. A formidable achievement for 30 family-owned businesses. Grant is immensely proud of what he has achieved in life with his wife, not just in business or as parents (of four daughters) and the fantastic experiences they have had. He shares "For us we are proud we have done so by our own hard work, determination, and resilience. And importantly, creating a business that is revered for its values and positive culture, not just its market

leadership in size. Plus taking the step to self-employment from strong corporate careers also takes courage, including the courage to ignore well-meaning friends or colleagues who I call unintentional 'dream killers' - whose caring advice can be of the like "is it's too risky, you've got a great corporate career, is now the right time" etc - be careful of caring 'dream killers' in your life"

Combining Grant's two passions, GJ Gardner has always had close alliances with sport and last year the National Basketball League welcomed GJ Gardner Homes as the Presenting Partner of the men's competition for the next three years. Grant stated "GJ Gardner Homes are great supporters of sport from the main stage right down to the grass roots and club levels. At GJ's we believe in the value of sports. Not only for what it teaches us on the court, but for the values it can inspire off it." We have seen GJ's as supporters of many sports, including officials and major codes such as rugby league.

While Grant has had considerable time in the building industry his corporate career spanned many industry sectors. He shares he had no plan to leave school and "so don't be pressured if you don't know the career path you want. Get a good education, work hard to stand out from the crowd, take good opportunities and it will evolve." He believes a good education provides opportunity, adds life skills, experience, courage and a hard work ethos and you have a good recipe for success.

Prior to his time at GJ's Grant was Business Development Manager at Placemakers and Business Unit Manager at Carter Holt Harvey.



#### Gavin Scott (Attended 1963-1964)

Born in Hull, Yorkshire, Gavin emigrated with his family to New Zealand in 1961. We were very lucky to have him attend Karamu for two years before at the age of 17 he headed to the jungles of Borneo to spend a year as a volunteer teacher working with the children of headhunters. He then returned to New Zealand to study history and political science at the Victoria University of Wellington, and then journalism at the Wellington Polytechnic. Once married him and his wife Jane travelled overland to Britain then across Asia, through Sri Lanka, India, Kashmir, Pakistan, Afghanistan and Iran. In London Gavin worked for Shelter, the British housing charity, before joining the Times Educational Supplement, from which base he also wrote features for the London Times.

For two years, while still with the TES, he freelanced for BBC Radio, and in 1975 became a regular reporter and presenter on Radio Four's World at One, PM. and World This Weekend programmes.

He is more commonly regarded as an English novelist, broadcaster and writer of the Emmy-winning miniseries The Mists of Avalon, Small Soldiers, The Borrowers (starring John Goodman) and Legend of Earthsea. He spent ten years making films for British television before becoming a screenwriter, creating more than two hundred documentaries and short films for BBC and the commercial TV. including UK's prestigious Channel 4. His first assignment in the United States was with George Lucas. developing and scripting The Young Indiana Jones Chronicles. In 2006, his children's film Treasure Island Kids: The Battle for Treasure Island. starring Randy Quaid, was released

on DVD.

After five years as a reporter and program anchor for BBC Radio, Gavin began in 1980 making films for BBC Television's Newsnight, covering literary as well as political subjects; among his interviewees, J.B. Priestley, Christopher Isherwood, Iris Murdoch and John Fowles. He then made documentaries on science and culture for series such as Horizon and Man Alive before joining Channel 4 News, for which he made films until 1990.

Gavin changed tack and stood as a Liberal at the Parliamentary Byelection for the Liberal/SDP Alliance and came within 2,600 votes of taking the seat from the Conservative candidate Virginia Bottomley who went on to serve in John Major's cabinet.

It was during this time that he started writing novels, including Hot Pursuit, about a Russian satellite that crashed in New Zealand, and A Flight of Lies, about the hunt for the bones of Peking Man. He has recently written a Dickensian historical novel set in the nineteenth century, The Adventures of Toby Wey.

More recently Gavin has been a sculptor, creating shadow boxes similar to those of Joseph Cornell, using mass-produced toys as his medium. One of his assemblages, reflecting life in New Zealand when he was going to Karamu in 1963, has been bought by the New Zealand government.



Stephen Hensman (Attended 1973-1976)

When Stephen left Karamu High School it was to be a gardener. Today, however, he is well known in New Zealand educational circles having spent the last 35 years teaching. Starting out as an English teacher, then head of department, before becoming a deputy principal, to most recently principal at Taradale High School, he is now an education consultant for Interlead. It was while he worked at Cornwall Park as a gardener for Hastings City Council, he would observe a teacher who occasionally visited the park with his class and hear delightful conversations with the children about plants and biology, and while observing the quality of his interactions with his tamariki, that he decided he wanted to have that kind of connection with learners too, so he applied for teacher training. And as they say ... the rest is history. When at school no way was he going to be a teacher, he told anyone who would listen that he could not imagine spending all his life in school - and he has done virtually just that. But when he looks back, he realizes he had always been a teacher. Growing up, he and one of his brothers had a blackboard in their bedroom, which would sometimes be used to teach the fascinating things learned at school that day. That same passion for passing on knowledge has never left him.

What Stephen has most enjoyed about the journey that his life post Karamu has taken him on is that 'Education changes lives'. The NZ Children's Commissioner reminds us of the significance of the relationship between teachers and students – for the good and for the bad. Stephen has predominantly contributed to positive relationships and educational outcomes, enriching the lives of many young people.

Stephen shares with us that sometimes adults tell young people to follow their passions, which is great advice... if you have a passion. Sometimes they tell you to have plan, which is great advice... if you know your destination. His experience of careers is that sometimes the career finds you, and sometimes the passion joins you on the journey. He didn't start out with a passion, a plan, or a place to go, but discovered all three by giving things a go. So go out there and give it a go!

#### **Jordyn Nicholson (Deputy)**

How crazy it is we have finished our five years at Karamu High School. Starting here I knew no one. I came from a small country school in Tikokino, Tikokino Primary Iol. 






# BUSINESS STUDIES

We also give them strategies to understand and process the information that they are presented with daily,

now and in the future. Our students will have the ability to become independent and perceptive leaders of the future.

We are excited about the impending changes that the NCEA review will bring, and we are already revamping our programmes in preparation. It has provided both the students and teachers the opportunity for innovation. We see our Karamu High School English graduate as an articulate, discerning and empathetic individual, who's curiosity inspires lifelong learning.

#### SPEECH

Year 12 student, Lena Ormsby has had a remarkable year as both a speechmaker and competitor. Her year started with the Race for Unity competition. For 20 years these awards have enabled students to share their visions for race unity, and to explore how we can "move the waka of humanity forward." This year's topic, Ngā matimati nō te ringa kotahi - the fingers of one hand," required speakers to consider how: The wellbeing and progress of all parts of humanity are inextricably linked, like the fingers of one hand. Lena spoke confidently and passionately about how race should not define who you are. She explored the ways we unwittingly perpetuate racist attitudes through the rhymes we chant, and our judgment of others based on appearance. This was followed by the Lions Club Young Speechmaker Contest. As part of the Lions competition, Lena was required to present on an impromptu topic for two minutes. With only a minute to prepare for this year's prompt - When I grow up, Lena defined her future role as being a storyteller, the guardian of cultures and helping others move forward. The audience and judges were captivated by Lena's focus on others rather than self, and her confidence throughout the competition. Lena went on to represent the region at the Lions' Regional Competition in Feilding. She placed second in each of these competitions, which prepared her well for the highlight of her year; the Ngā Manu Kōrero Te Mataua a Māui Speech Competition. Building on her previous speeches Lena focused on racial issues and the need to question, in order to understand and break the silence of racism. Lena believes that by doing this we can "help others find their confidence and find their culture to move forward." Again, part of the competition was an impromptu speech: five topics to choose from; five minutes to prepare. Lena chose the topic New World, New Values and used Tūtira Mai Ngā Iwi by Wi Huata, as her inspiration, as it had been sung at the start of the day. Lena won both aspects of the competition, adding to her success at the same competition in 2021.

#### **MĀORI**

"Ka mahuta a Matariki ki te pae, ka mahuta o tātau tūmanako ki te tau"

Karamu celebrated Matariki with a range of activities that coincided with the Tangaroa moon phase. Our students signed up for Matariki workshops and we had members of our community come in to run wānanga on mau rākau, poi, toi Māori, and kēmu taketake. Our te reo and te ao Māori classes also put down a hāngī as a part of the new year celebrations. Many thanks to Lucky Morete, Solomon Blake, Darryl Thomson and Pikihoro Stewart who supported us during the week's activities.

"Kōrero Māori i ngā wā katoa, i ngā wāhi katoa"

This year was a significant one, being 50 years since the Māori language petition was taken to parliament. Karamu celebrated Te Wiki o te reo Māori in a number of ways, with activities led by our senior kāhui. They included Māorioke, Te kete te pūtea rānei (money or the bag), Haka Off challenge, and Pepe Takimanawa (tongue twisters). We also joined the rest of the motu in remembering the petition and it's significance to the revival of te reo Māori in Aotearoa. 




#### MEDIA STUDIES

It is very pleasing to see our involvement in the Pūhoro


STEMM program go from strength to strength. Mr Jon Matthews, our assistant head of faculty, has led and inspired our Māori ākonga to increasing levels of success.

Our topics allow us to consider the past – particularly our New Zealand history and past events but also present-day issues, and possible futures. Our students are storytellers, investigators, and agents of change in social studies as we present real life scenarios where we can draw from learners' lived experiences, whakapapa, and prior knowledge. This also enables the engagement of whānau, local cultures and communities in the learning process which is something we hope to build on more in 2023 and beyond.




























I love inhaling the cool afternoon air, under the blossoming bough of the cherry tree. I escape car horns and crowded streets. The city wiped out by a magical stone wall.

every copy is unique.


My soulmate, exact but opposite.

# DUKE OF ED

## GOLD

The gold Duke of Edinburgh group went on our urban planned adventure to Wellington during the Term 3 holidays. The adventurous journey is required to tick off our gold award. 



This year, Karamu was fortunate to establish a relationship with Te Whare Tū Tauā o Ngā Tukemata. Our students had the opportunity to learn mau rākau - a form of Māori martial arts and weaponry. We were able to offer Karamu High School as a practice venue, and trained twice a week. Our students were able to meet up with others from the wider community, and learn mau rākau under Te Whare Tū Tauā o Aotearoa. This kaupapa has many aspects to it, not least, learning about our atua, karakia, and te reo Māori.










### **Proudly Hastings**






