Kia ora e te whānau

Over the second half of the term, I have continued to speak to students about the importance of demonstrating our school values. Values are core beliefs and principles that guide how someone lives their life and makes their decisions. They shape priorities, behaviour and how people interact with others. We have had our Karamū WELCOME values as the cornerstone of developing character, behaviour and priorities for over 10 years.

A key part of school life is for students to understand how to execute and demonstrate our school values, as well as being acknowledged for the positive behaviour they are showcasing.

At Karamū High School, we want to acknowledge students who go out of their way to demonstrate our school values. Above all, they are demonstrating actions that are deemed positive and constructive in wider societal life. If students go above and beyond what is expected, we want to reward them.

Therefore, if students go out of their way to demonstrate our school values or go above and beyond what is expected of them, teachers will acknowledge this by giving them some Karamū currency (in the form of a green token) and Karamu Recognition, which is added to the student's record.

Students celebrate this success by placing their green token in their respective house box which will be displayed in the school office. At the end of the term, the house with the most tokens will generate house points for the end of year trophy.

Also, once a student reaches 10 Karamū Recognitions, they will be rewarded with a \$10 canteen voucher.

Acknowledging and celebrating success is an important part of life. Teachers at Karamū High School want students to know when they have done something positive.

So, my challenge to all students is to 'better your best' and take pride in demonstrating our school values, because, if you do, you will be acknowledged by our teachers and staff. This kaupapa helps create a school environment where everyone feels connected, supported, and valued. #ProudlyKaramū

Students Driving

It is great to see many of our senior students gaining their restricted licence and enjoying the independence of driving to and from school. With this privilege comes responsibility, and we encourage families to have conversations at home about the conditions of a restricted licence in New Zealand. These include:

- No passengers unless a supervisor with a full licence (2+ years) is in the car.
- Driving is only allowed between 5am and 10pm, unless accompanied by a supervisor.

We appreciate your support in reinforcing these conditions, helping to keep all our students and wider community safe on the road.

ACTING DEPUTY PRINCIPAL - PASTORAL

Kia ora e te whānau,

Term 3 is coming to an end, and it can be a time of stress for our senior students as they reflect on derived grade results and start making decisions about their pathways for 2026. Most students will be making subject choices while others will be looking at tertiary study post secondary education, and others may be looking at work and apprenticeships. The point to note is they don't have to make these decisions alone and can come and speak to their teachers, deans and careers advisors here at school so that they can make informed decisions.

Moving into the holiday period we look to prepare for a new term, so it's a timely reminder about a few of our school processes, starting with a reminder about non-regulation items for our return to school in Term 4. During the holiday break some students do experiment with piercings and hair colour, just a reminder that students are to have natural hair colour and may have no more than two studs or sleepers in each ear, the size being no bigger than a standard piercing. The earrings are to be non-dangly and not too large for health and safety reasons. The only other additional piercing is a single nose stud. No other facial or visible body or tongue piercings are permitted. Any enquiries and clarification can be put past me and found in the schools code of conduct.

Finally as we move into Term 4, the new season of summer sports kicks off. Getting involved in extra curricular activities is hugely beneficial for our young people, joining into new friend groups, participation and exercise, as well as being part of a team. I would encourage students to find their niche or try something new, and get involved with the wider opportunities available to them.

Kia ora e te whānau,

Last week, our senior students engaged in derived grade exams and targeted workshops, offering valuable insights into their academic progress and helping them complete key classroom tasks. For those who sat exams, we strongly encourage students to reflect on the feedback provided by their teachers - this guidance will be crucial in helping them better their best as they prepare for the upcoming NCEA externals.

For those who attended workshops, the focused two-hour sessions provided rich opportunities for teaching and learning, reinforcing key concepts and supporting progress toward academic goals.

Countdown to Exams

As we move into Term 4, it's important to note the limited time remaining for senior students. Year 12 and 13 have 18 days of class time left and Year 11s have 23 days. To maximise learning, Year 11 students will remain at school for one additional week, as Level 1 exams begin later than Level 2 and 3.

The key exam and finish dates for seniors:

Year 12 and 13 final day at school: Friday 31 October Level 2 and 3 exams: Begin Tuesday 4 November **Year 11** final day at school: *Friday 7 November* Level 1 exams: Begin Monday 10 November

A reminder to caregivers and students: The Homework Centre remains open until Wednesday 29 October on Wednesday morning: 8:00 am and afternoon: 3:00pm - 4:00pm.

Many courses will also be offering subject-specific tutorials during study leave. We encourage all students to attend and actively seek support. Asking questions is key to deepening understanding and building confidence.

Once senior students begin study leave, Year 9 and 10 will transition into Junior High, with exciting opportunities for all learners at Karamū High School to re-focus in the five weeks of school and to experience different, structured activities that are fun, engaging and motivating, that involve innovation, competition and leadership.




CURRICULUM AND NCEA UPDATE



Throughout the year, the Ministry of Education has been communicating information via the media of the changes to NCEA and the curriculum. In the last two weeks, we received information of the Years 11 – 13 subjects for the national curriculum. These are meant to provide greater choice, clear pathways and opportunities for specialisation, setting students up for success in future study or their chosen profession. Many of these subjects are already available through NCEA. Some are new, while others have been renamed, reorganised or refocused to ensure knowledge-rich subjects and provide clear pathways. Some subjects will be developed by the Ministry, and some by industry.

The first year of implementation for new subjects will be 2028 for Year 11, 2029 for Year 12 and 2030 for Year 13. As always, we will continue to keep you informed of any changes as they evolve.

INNERVATE RESOURCE - PASSING EXAMS



Earlier this term, as part of our preparations for the upcoming Derived Grade school exams, all Year 11 students took part in a two-hour study session led by Patrick Sherratt from Innervate.

focused This interactive workshop on "how to study" and gave students practical tools to help them succeed, from boosting motivation and managing distractions to improving memory retention and reducing exam nerves.

For students who were unable to attend or are in Years 12 and 13, Innervate has made a version of their Passing Exams Programme available online. This purchasable resource offers similar guidance and strategies to support students as they prepare for their NCEA end-of-year exams.

GRIEF AND LOSS

Grief can be an extremely painful process. You may experience all kinds of emotions and physical reactions. You may feel you will never recover from the loss, or that you don't know how you are going to carry on.

We experience grief if we lose people we love, or things or places we are attached to, including:

- people through death or a relationship break-up or because a relationship changes
- health through illness or accident
- things we own by accident or theft
- places through moving countries, schools, houses or cities
- our place in the world through losing a place on a team or a job, or because we have changed ourselves
- pets

Grieving is a very individual process. How you grieve will be different from how others grieve. Many factors influence this, including your personality, your life experience, how you cope under stress, your faith or your spiritual beliefs, and the support system you have at the time of the loss.

The circumstances around the loss are likely to affect how you experience grief, too. For example, some people may have had more time to prepare for the loss, while other circumstances mean that a loss has happened very suddenly. Whatever factors are at play, there is no right or wrong way to grieve.

The time it takes for you to grieve is unique to you. There is no set time or process, grieving and healing takes as long as it takes. For some that could be weeks, for some months and others longer still. However, it's important to know that over time the emotions of sadness, numbness or anger do fade and become more manageable as you start to rebuild your life.



A FRESH TAKE ON COURSE SELECTION



All Year 11 students attended our inaugural course selection expo, where they spent an hour exploring courses they could take in Year 12 and discovering the opportunities that each option could open to them. This has since been followed up with students receiving their 2026 course selection form for informed completion before the end of the term.

The expo was designed to be interactive and offer akonga a wide range of ways to explore the courses on offer in the 2026 course selection booklet.

At each of the 12 stations, akonga completed activities. All correct entries went in the draw for a voucher to spend at Lantern Light Dairy and a sweet treat from Whittaker's!

The Expo was an exciting success, with room to grow as teaching, learning, and technology changes in the future.

Akonga also left the expo with a "passport" that included optional tools to help them organise, research, and prioritise courses they want to take in Year 12 and beyond.

WINTER SPORT WRAP UP

As winter sports finish, we can look back on the amazing season all of our teams and students have had. Karamū had an incredible 45 teams, across seven sports entered in Hawke's Bay secondary school competitions, with our students demonstrating dedication, excellence, teamwork, and whanaungatanga.

Netball

We had one of our most exciting and competitive seasons with six teams reaching the first and second play off games in the Hawke's Bay Secondary School (HBSS) Saturday Competition. Three of our teams were winners of their divisions, four finished as runners up, and two finished fourth. Our teams trained hard all season and the growth shown by all the players from the beginning to the end of season was fantastic to see.

Basketball

This year we had six teams representing Karamū across various grades. It was a rebuilding year for many of our teams with only one returning player in our Senior A boys team and a completely new junior girls team. Results are as follows:

- Senior A Boys: fifth in Senior Boys division 2
- Senior A Girls: Top 4 finish in Senior Girls division 1
- Junior A Girls: Fourth in Senior Girls division 1
- Junior A Boys: Sixth in Junior Boys division 2
- Junior B Boys and KHS Green: Both teams made huge improvements throughout the season, competing in the Basketball HB Friday night jam competition.

Badminton

This season saw a record 12 teams compete in the HBSS Badminton League. Due to such a high interest in participating, this lead to the introduction of a new social league. Run once a week after school, students who were not quite ready for the competitive league, were able to join their friends and have some fun playing badminton. A highlight was our Senior A boys finishing as the winners of B Grade, winning 23 out of 24 sets in the championships rounds.

Football

It was another great season for our football teams with four teams representing the school. A 1st XI girls (div 1), a 1st XI boys (div 2), a 2nd XI boys (div 3), and a junior boys. Our girls had a fantastic season, securing their first wins in the past two seasons, and showing immense growth as a team. The 1st XI boys also had a great season, finishing in second place in the senior boys div 2. A highlight was the junior boys finishing fourth (out of 10) in their division, as a majority of the players had never played football before this year.

Hockey

This year we had three teams representing the school. Our 1st XI girls made the step up to div 1 for the first time with lots of learning coming out of the season, and managing to come away with some great wins. They finished off their season by competing at the NZSS Jenny Hair Tier 3 Tournament held in Napier during winter tournament week. The 2nd XI had a solid season finishing sixth out of 11 teams in div 3. It was also great to be able to field a mixed team, combined with Havelock North High School, for our boys to have the opportunity to play.
