#### DUX

Nina Paljk is the 2025 Karamū High School Dux. This year, she was awarded Distinction and First in Level Three calculus, biology, chemistry, physics, and Japanese. Alongside Dux, Nina was also awarded the prize for General Excellence. This is Nina's fifth year winning a top academic award, having earned the top awards in Years 9, 10, 11, and 12. She had NCEA Levels One and Two endorsed with Excellence. Nina won best NCEA Level One results from a Year 10 student in 2022; best NCEA Level One results in 2023; and best NCEA Level Two results in 2024. Additionally, she gained an NZQA scholarship in history as a Year 11 student.

Outside the classroom, Nina is involved in Academic Institute, chess club, DanceNZMade, debating, Japanese trivia, volunteers as a tutor, and has a part-time job as a pharmacy assistant. In January, she attended the Hands-On at Otago programme on a science scholarship. She is also an academic leader, helping to run the school's homework centre.

## **PRINCIPAL**

Tēnā koutou tēnā koutou tēnā koutou katoa,

As the seniors left this term we have been speaking with the juniors around the ways we can 'feel good'. That feeling of good comes from one of the 'feel good' hormones called serotonin. We can increase serotonin levels a number of ways. A natural way to increase serotonin is by exercising. When you play sport, cycle, walk or lift weights, your body releases more tryptophan - the amino acid your brain uses to make serotonin. This boost in serotonin is why many people get that feeling of euphoria known as a "runner's high" after an intense workout. Get out there this summer and exercise – it makes you 'feel good'!

Exposure to the sun is another way to naturally increase serotonin levels. The saying 'the winter blues' may be triggered by a drop in serotonin levels. But remember to be sun smart too!

Other lifestyle adjustments like getting enough sleep, eating well, performing meditation or yoga, and listening to music can also help boost serotonin levels.

We can also raise our own feel-good hormones by spreading good. We can do that for free as simply as offering a smile. This friendly gesture can brighten someone's day, whether you're at a store, at school, or simply passing by someone on the street. For someone having a rough day, a smile can make a world of difference. And I am sure you have heard me say before, it takes only 17 muscles to smile, compared to 43 to frown. So smile at someone – you'll feel good and so will they!

The junior school's enthusiastic involvement in the annual Christmas cheer appeals over the last two weeks was a tangible way to spread good through the concept of giving. The phrase "for it is in giving that we receive" is a line from the Prayer of St. Francis of Assisi. It means that by giving to others one will in turn receive those same things. The act of giving, rather than seeking to be consoled or understood, is what ultimately brings fulfillment. Another 'good feeling'. It suggests that true fulfillment comes from selflessly helping others. The act of giving is intrinsically rewarding - it makes us 'feel good'.

The generous donations of gifts and food was truly inspiring and remarkable. Women's Refuge is dedicated to supporting women, children, and whanau in their journey to break free from family violence and our support for organisations like this reflects our commitment to embracing diversity and practicing manaakitanga. Thank you for giving us the opportunity to show such strong support.

We then of course had two tremendous occasions to be 'Proudly Karamū' - senior and junior prizegiving. A heartfelt congratulations to everyone who was recognised. Each day, we are proud to witness the growth of our young people as they develop into successful and valued members of society.

Anyone can review any policy/procedure that has a red, review flag.



# KARAMŪ STUDENT HITS THE RIGHT NOTES

#### Media Release Karamū student hits the right notes on and off the stage

Karamū High School Year 12 student Maaki Wairau is hitting all the right notes, both on and off the stage.

The 17-year-old (Ngāti Porou, Ngāti Kahungunu, Ngāi Tūhoe) recently performed the lead role of Figaro in Mozart's Le Nozze di Figaro with Project Prima Volta's SCENA Opera. He also performed in El Barberillo de Lavapiés, a Spanish piece featuring the charismatic Barber of Madrid.

To prepare for the role, Maaki undertook weekly vocal lessons with Festival Opera Artistic Director José Aparicio and spent much of the school holidays rehearsing.

"It was pretty fun," Maaki says. "It's been intense but really rewarding. I've learned a lot."

His journey with Project Prima Volta began in Year 7, when he was introduced to classical music through a school trip. Initially mistaking the group for a gospel choir, Maaki was surprised to find himself singing opera.

"It was different to what I'd been doing with kapa haka and soul music, but over time I started to really enjoy it."

After a break from PPV in Year 11, Maaki returned this year, motivated in part by the passing of his stepfather, Sam Tiuka.

"He really enjoyed my performances," Maaki says. "But I also wanted to go back into PPV because the number of opportunities that you get is quite crazy."

"PPV has taught me a lot about stage presence and looking after my voice. It's like a semiprofessional environment where you learn to perform properly."

Outside of music, Maaki's creativity extends to the kitchen. He and teammate Brodie Russell placed second in the Hawke's Bay Secondary Schools Culinary Competition with a dish featuring lamb sirloin, dukkah breadcrumbs, microgreens, charred red onion, kumara hummus, Greek yogurt and basil sauce.

He is also active in sport, captaining Karamū's softball team, playing for Karamū's A basketball team and representing the region in the HB U16 Māori rugby rep team.

Maaki credits Karamū High School for supporting his diverse interests.

"They've given me opportunities in music, sport and even culinary arts. Whether it's hiring instruments, letting me take lead roles or helping us enter competitions, they've been really supportive."

"Karamū isn't just about one thing," he adds. "We're pretty decent at everything; sport, music, food tech, and I like that."

Looking ahead, Maaki plans to study a Bachelor of Music majoring in opera singing at the University of Waikato in 2027.

"They've got great contacts in opera. Maybe later I'll study abroad. Opera singers often peak in their thirties, so I've got time."

Though opera is now his passion, Maaki remains grounded. "If not opera, I've thought about becoming a teacher. We need more teachers, and I'd love to be a high school music teacher."

Principal Dionne Thomas says: "Maaki is another example of us providing opportunities for students in a diverse range of areas, whether it be on the stage, on the field or in the kitchen. Every child at Karamū can find their passion".

faced a series of tricky, timed questions. A correct response on the first attempt earned five points, with the points available dropping every minute. Finally, the two Karamū teams joined forces for a combined challenge, facing off against a final timed set of questions where students had to be tactical, deciding whether to persevere with a tough question or pass on it in the hope of finding one they could more confidently tackle.

After each round, the students could still be found whispering excitedly, determined to crack the problems they didn't quite reach during competition time. As a mathematics teacher, there's nothing better than seeing the 'Aha!' moment light up a student's face once something clicks! While we did not secure a podium placing this year, the energy, teamwork, and enthusiasm on display were outstanding. The students are already talking about returning next year, this time with another year's worth of mathematical experience and even more confidence.



A huge thank you goes to the organisers for putting together such a fantastic event, to our Year 12 supporter Amelia Cooper, and of course to our star-studded team of young mathematicians who represented Karamū well with their skill, determination, and genuine joy for mathematics. It is wonderful to see mathematics success alive and well in Hawke's Bay, and even better to have opportunities like this for students to celebrate and share it.

# UNIFORM GUIDELINES REMINDER





#### Year 9 - 12 Students

- Karamū High School tartan skirt, black shorts or trousers or grey shorts
- Karamū High School blouse/shirt
- Karamū High School green jersey
- Black pantyhose or Karamū High School white socks (with skirt)
- Karamū High School grey socks (with shorts)
- Black leather shoes from the approved list
- Karamū High School black trousers
- Plain black leather belt
- Karamū High School sports top
- Karamū High School sports shorts
- Karamū High School scarf (optional)
- Karamū High School regulation jacket (optional)
- Karamū High School cap (optional)
- Karamū High School blazer (optional for Year 12 and Year 13 only)



- All Karamū High School uniform items with the exception of shoes must be purchased from the school's uniform shop. These items carry our school crest or are labelled as Karamū High School uniform.
- No jackets or scarves are to be worn other than those from the approved uniform lists below.
- Due to health and safety rules, covered footwear must be worn ie no sandals. Shoes should be black leather (or leather like) as per the approved list available at the office.
- Only white T-shirts or white short sleeved poly-props are to be worn under the uniform.
- Undergarments should not hang below the blouse/shirt.
- Hair is to be tidy, of a natural colour and long hair must be tied back for health and safety reasons.
- Hair bands are to be black or blend with the hair colour.
- Facial hair should be tidy and groomed.
- Earrings: students may have no more than two studs or sleepers in each ear (the size being no bigger than a hole punch).
- Students may have one small nose stud. No other facial or visible body or tongue piercings are permitted.
- A watch can be worn, but may need to be removed for examinations.
- One neck taonga (pounamu, bone carvings, religious attire) are
- No other jewellery ie: bracelets, anklets, rings etc may be worn, however the principal will consider special requests.
- Only natural coloured make-up including nail polish, eye shadow, eye liner and foundation are permitted.
- Tattoos/Tāmoko are permitted unless deemed inappropriate or offensive.
